Our History

Youth2Youth 4 Change is a coalition of youth and adults throughout Rock County that began in 1991.

The coalition was formed in response to Rock County's high rates of tobacco use, under the name Rock County Tobacco Free Coalition. In 1995 the first youth prevention programs were implemented, and the focus of the coalition turned towards youth tobacco prevention. At this time the coalition's name was changed to Rock County Tobacco Free Kids.

In 2005 our coalition began implementing environmental strategies to create lasting community change. Our focus turned to work on smoke-free air as well as other alcohol and drug misuse initiatives. The name of our coalition became Youth2Youth of Rock County and our vision became creating Drug Free communities. In 2014 the coalition voted to change our name to Youth 2 Youth 4 Change because it reflects our mission to create positive community change.

- 121 advocacy presentations were delivered to 5,337 youth. *
- 252 Rock County teens served as Teen Advocates.
- Contacted 867 Youth2Youth alumni to develop an alumni group for Call to Actions and Sustainability.
- Latinos Against Drugs has a membership of 15 middle and high school youth who presented to 100 Latino adults about tobacco, underage drinking, and prescription drug misuse in Spanish. They helped coordinate 5 community booths focusing on the Latino Community.
- Jinan Sous served as a statewide FACT board member.
- Khari Frazer and Jinan Sous served as youth board members on the Youth2Youth 4 Change coalition board.
- The coalition assisted in passing a comprehensive E-Cigarette ordinance in the town of Beloit.
- The 6th annual youth summit was held in August. 52 youth attended the summit that focused on empowering youth to build on teamwork.
- A 25 Year Anniversary Celebration was held in October, drawing over 100 attendees, including alumni, legislators, and community members.
- 20 Community education booths distributed education materials to over 2,000 community residents.
- Several program materials were translated into Spanish so education efforts can be culturally diverse.
- 5 Above the Influence events that reached over 500 Beloit youth, providing a fun, drug free environment.
- Youth2Youth 4 Change is a coalition of over 50 adults and 250 teens that are making a difference.

Media

• **55 Media hits** were placed for Youth2Youth activities through newspaper, radio and television to promote our program activities.

- Over **300** hits were made on our **Facebook** page that reached **1000s** of people.
- Over 75 hits were made on Twitter, reaching over 500 people.
- Over 5,000 discount cards were distributed to educate about the importance of locking up and disposing of medications.
- **150 Yard Signs** in English and Spanish were distributed to remind adults not to host underage drinking parties.

Compliance Checks

- Held annually with the assistance of community police departments.
- Alcohol: 58 businesses were visited and 8 of them sold alcohol to underage youth.
- Tobacco: 137 businesses were visited and 19 of them sold tobacco to underage youth. This considerably higher than 2015.

2nd Annual After Prom

- Held at the community movie theatre.
- **110** local teens attended and had a great, drug free time.
- \$1,500 in-kind donations were given by local businesses and organizations.



Social Norms: High School

Alcohol

76% of Beloit teens did not report using Alcohol in the past 30 days!

This is 6% better than 2014, when the survey was last administered.

Prescription Drugs

94% of Beloit teens did not report misusing prescription drugs in the past 30 days!

This is 6% better than 2014, when the survey was last administered.



Tobacco

94% of Beloit teens did not report using tobacco in the past 30 days!

This is 2% better than 2014, when the survey was last administered.

E-Cigarettes

96% of Beloit teens did not report using E-cigarettes in the past 30 days!

> Nationally, only 84% did not report E-cigarette use.



Marijuana

85% of Beloit teens did not report using marijuana in the past 30 days!

This is 8% better than 2014, when the survey was last administered.

Social Norms: Intermediate School

Tobacco

98% of Beloit middle school students did not report using tobacco in the past 30 days!



Prescription Drugs

95% of Beloit middle school youth did not report misusing prescription drugs in the past 30 days!

Alcohol

89% of Beloit middle school youth did not report using Alcohol in the past 30 days!

Marijuana

95% of Beloit middle school youth did not report using marijuana in the past 30 days!
